Food for Thought Company's coming – let's have lasagna!

December is for many a time to get together with family and friends, and that usually means serving special foods. This month's recipe is a healthy updated version of the classic favorite: Lasagna. I made a vat of this to serve a group of my co-workers when they all came for dinner. Most of our guests didn't know we are vegetarian. The following day at the office, one of the guys who did know, asked what we had used instead of meat in the sauce for the lasagna. At co-worker this, another (who struggles rather unsuccessfully to keep her weight down) turned and asked incredulously: "You mean there wasn't any meat in that?!" "Oh, no," I replied. "In fact, everything served last night, including the chocolate-raspberry torte was low-fat and cholesterol-free." She shook her head in amazement; her only comment: "Well, if I'd known that I'd have eaten more!"

So give this guilt-free indulgence a try. The recipe doubles well. (It easily serves a dozen as a main course, or a couple of dozen if you're serving other dishes.)

Did you know? According to Michael Quinion, the word lasagna derives from the Vulgar Latin lasania for a cooking pot, though its insalubrious origins are said to in the older Latin lasanum for a chamber pot (though some Italian etymologists prefer to find an origin in the classical Greek lagana, a type of unleavened flat bread not unlike pasta).

Lasagna

Sauce:

Sauté in a little olive oil or water: 1 medium onion, chopped 3 cloves of garlic, minced 2 cups sliced mushrooms (optional)

Stir in:

1- 680ml can of all-purpose tomato sauce, plus an equal amount of water 3/4 C. T.V.P. granules * (not the chunks or slices varieties of T.V.P.)
1 tsp salt
1/2 tsp. dried rosemary
1/2 tsp. dried oregano

Tofu Cottage Filling:

To the blender also add:

Open 1-454 g package of medium firm tofu. Drain the water. Put half of the tofu in a bowl and the other half of the tofu into a blender.

2 tsp. apple cider vinegar 4 tsp. lemon juice 4 green onions (or 1 large leek), chopped 2 tsp dry dillweed 1/2 tsp. salt Blend until smooth and creamy. Set aside. Then, using a fork, mash the tofu that's in the bowl. Stir in the blended mixture. (Optional: add 1/4 cup parmesan cheese if you like.)

To assemble the lasagna:

Use 1-500 g package of lasagna noodles, the sauce and tofu cottage filling that you've just prepared, along with some grated tofu mozzarella cheese (about 150-200 g should do). Into a 9"x13" pan, layer the ingredients as follows:

sauce, noodles, sauce, noodles, tofu cottage filling, noodles, sauce, noodles, sauce, tofu cheese.

Cover loosely and bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour. (It's a good idea to spray the inside of the cover - an inverted cookie sheet or simply some aluminum foil - with cooking spray to prevent sticking.)

* T.V.P. has been mentioned in this column before. It is such a staple item and many people are just beginning to discover its usefulness. T.V.P. stands for texturized vegetable protein. It is a soy product, and as such, is cholesterol-free and an excellent source of protein. You can buy it in bulk at Vita-Health in Osborne Village. As long as it doesn't get wet, T.V.P. keeps for ages, so buy a big bag and store in a cool, dry place. You can experiment, substituting it in many recipes where ground beef is called for. It works especially well with tomato sauces.

COOL JOBS IN THE HOOD

a regular feature focusing on local residents with really cool jobs.

Kelly Klick has a really cool job - she's a Midwife. Why is being a midwife cool? Family doctors, obstetricians, nurses - they all do things that are fairly similar (and those are cool jobs too!). But a midwife is cool because once upon a time, almost all babies everywhere were delivered midwives and then in some parts of the world, midwifery became illegal practicing medicine without a license! They even used to be accused of being witches in some places. Now midwives are back and they're legal.

"Midwife" means "with wife" (or more generally, "with woman"). More than 80 percent of babies world-wide are born into the caring, skillful hands of a midwife. In 1997, the Manitoba government declared midwifery an independent, regulated health care service. The Manitoba *Midwifery Act* was proclaimed on June 12, 2000 Manitoba is the fourth province in Canada to take this step. There are currently 16 midwives in the City of Winnipeg. For more information, see the College of Midwives web site: http://www.midwives.mb.ca/

Kelly had her three children in her home with midwives. Kelly was so impressed, she wanted to become a midwife, but first there was no midwifery program and then in the first years that the program in Ontario started, it was very difficult to get in. So Kelly became a volunteer with Mothercraft - being a volunteer birth partner for teen-age girls who did not have a partner; then a registered childbirth educator and volunteer with Planned Parenthood, then registered Doula. A Doula is a professional labour-support partner. but a Doula does not catch the babies. Kelly Then got into Ryerson University's midwifery program. Upon graduation, Kelly returned to Winnipeg to begin her career as a midwife.

NATURE NOTES – Vere Scott

An Old Field Urban Park

The relentlessness of city park planners: I dread it. Trained in landscape architecture, which usually places great emphasis on understanding ecosystems, one might expect them to show particular understanding of the importance of ecological diversity and local integrity. In practice, unfortunately, it is the architecture aspect of their training that dominates. They view "undeveloped" land as blank canvas. Wendell Berry says one of the problems humans have is we have to act, and we almost act with hubris. always presumption and with ignorance — for our knowledge of the world will always be partial. Professionals, like park planners, illustrate Berry's point.

Churchill Parkway is interrupted at Don Gerrie Park's western end by the Redboine marina and private properties. From the Banana Boat north to The Forks is an old field followed by a Manitoba maple and cottonwood river bottom forest. It's a place filled with opportunities for adventure, surprises and natural history learning for youngsters who, for decades, have been systematically deprived of the meadows, forests, and jungles of the "vacant" lots numerous in the 1940s and '50s Riverview of my youth.

Hands On Design and ad goes here

The relatively new 10-foot wide gravel path is attracting increasing use by pedestrians, joggers, bicyclists, even a young vegetable gardener — and a few natural history aficionados. There has been little development —yet.

Beginning ecology students learn about natural processes called "succession". Succession is the process whereby plant communities and their associated animal communities recover from disturbance. One of the classic models is Old Field succession. Everyone is familiar with it. Abandoned farms are "invaded" by "weeds" and their associated animals. The weeds are, in turn, replaced perhaps by grass, perhaps by shrubs, or trees — depending on topography, climate, and many other factors.

There is history here in this Old Field. Awareness and knowledge of place is important: it demonstrates respect. From the Selkirk settlers' arrival, present-day Lord Roberts, Riverview and Fort Rouge to the north was divided into about 12 river lots. This land tenure was based on New France's seigneurial system of long, narrow river lots. Although each lot was up to 3 km deep (extending west to present-day Waverley Street), it had a river frontage of 150-250m only. This pattern provided access to both river transportation and to neighbours. Near the settlers' homes and outbuildings, the fertile black river soil so familiar to today's allotment

gardeners grew grains vegetables; further back (west) grew hay and pasture. An 1830s' survey depicted no woods on the lowland east of Hay/Casey streets. The woods on the Red's east bank provided timber and fuel - 100 acres for each five settlers on the west. In administering Churchill Parkway North, I would like the City to restrain its powerful development instincts. I propose this section be left to natural processes and that interpretation of natural community succession be made its focus. For a change, all monies conventionally spent on park development and maintenance would be reallocated and dedicated to dynamic nature interpretation at a level not yet seen in Winnipeg. Apparently precedent exists no designating an urban park as old field.

Year after year, the educational value of the changing plant and animal communities of an old field urban park would be immense and growing.

Professionalism longs for answers that are uniform and universal—the same styles, explanations, routines, tools, models. methods. beliefs, everybody, amusements...for everywhere." Monocultures of the mind. It is this tendency toward the Mcdonaldization of Churchill Parkway

that distresses me.

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COMMUNITY CONSTABLE REPORT

Greetings from your Community Constable.

I hope that everyone had a pleasant and happy Thanksgiving and that your Halloween went off without a hitch.

There are a couple of incidents I would like to bring to your attention for the month of October.

First, on October 19th emergency personnel were dispatched and attended to a working fire on the 400 block of Beresford Avenue. They arrived to find that some paper and leaves had been set ablaze near the rear walk-out basement door. This caused the door itself to ignite. Fire Department personnel extinguished the minor blaze and total damage to the property is estimated at \$700. There were no injuries.

An investigation led to apprehension of three youth who admitted to setting the place on fire. All three of the youth were under 10 years old and live in the neighborhood. The youth were warned and their parents notified.

Second, between October 4th and the 10th a 27 year old male attended to five homes in the Fort Rouge and Crescentwood area where he managed to gain entry by forcing open sliding doors. After information was received by the Winnipeg Police, this male was arrested by District 6 detectives and he subsequently admitted to all the break-ins and has been charged.


Call me ART! Remembering Bill Mason by Don Munro

The painting "After the Game" was the work of the most talented artist that ever came out of Riverview or Winnipeg. Not only could Bill Mason paint, but he produced movies such as "Death of a Legend," "Paddle to the Sea," and many more. He was nominated twice for Academy Awards. Bill was also an excellent teacher and paddler in white water canoeing. His accomplishments are world renown. The Canadian government honoured him by commemorating a postal stamp in his honour in 1998. The picture "After the Game" was painted by Bill when he was in his early twenties about 55 years ago. His models were his nephew Bob Tipping and Don Munro, Both Bill and Bob are now deceased but Bill's art is still in demand. Recently in an art sale in eastern Canada, his paintings were sold out within an hour.
